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In Solidarity after the Peshawar Attacks

The Taliban's brutal and senseless attack on a school in Peshawar on December 16, 2014 left the world aghast and horrified.

Gordon Brown, former British Prime Minister, spoke of how the terrorist attacks "unite the world in outrage". In UK, we saw such demonstrations of unity as people from all backgrounds and affiliations came together to condemn the attacks and to stand in support with the victims and their families.

Vigils and prayers were held across the UK and people poured forward to express support and solidarity. MP's, politicians and celebrities offered their condolences. Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth sent a letter of condolence to the Pakistani President. UK Prime Minister, David Cameron, the Foreign Secretary, Phillip Hammond and many other politicians wrote letters of sympathy. Sir Nicholas Houghton, the British Chief of Defence Staff, visited the Pakistan High Commission in London to offer condolences.

British Pakistani MP's, politicians and other high profile figures, including Philip Barton, Baroness Sayeeda Warsi, Sadiq Khan MP, Sajjid Javed MP, Sajjad Karim MEP, Rehman Chisty MP and Malala Yousafzai decried the attacks and expressed sympathy for the victims.

The Pakistani cricket team donated all proceeds of a cricket match to the victims. Boxing champion Amir Khan, donated 30,000 shorts to help rebuild the army school in Peshawar school and has traveled to the site of the atrocities. As individuals and organisations with different mandates, affiliations and traditions came together, we witnessed the power of unity in assembly.
